The Interaction of Teacher and Parent Burnout and Preschooler's Social-Emotional Competence and Behavioral Self-Regulation

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QUESTIONS

- 1. Is the risk factor of teacher burnout related to social-emotional competence (SEC) and self-regulation in the spring of preschool?
- 2. Does low parent burnout act as a protective factor in the relation of teacher burnout and SEC and selfregulation?

BACKGROUND

- Teacher burnout is linked to adverse child outcomes including problem behaviors and poorer academic achievement (Friedman-Krauss et al., 2014; Madigan & Kim. 2021).
- 2. Lower parent burnout and higher parent well-being has been associated with social skill development (Hauser-Cram et al., 2001).
- 3. Preschooler's SEC and self-regulation are essential to later cognitive (Savina, 2021) and social development (Spivak & Farran, 2016).

METHODS

Participants: 126 preschool children (42% female; Mage = 5.1 years) lived at or below 127% of the federal poverty level.



MEASURES

Teacher and parent burnout: Validated questionnaires (Maslach & Jackson, 1981: Roskam, Raes, & Mikolajczak, 2017)

SEC: Teacher rated Social Skills Improvement System

Self-regulation: Head-Toes-Knees-Shoulders (HTKS) McClelland et al., 2014) Rating Scale (SSIS; Gresham &

Figure 1 Interaction of Teacher and Parent Burnout on Spring of Pre-K Social Skills

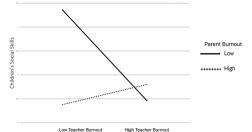
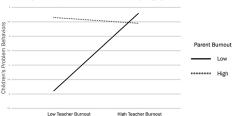


Figure 2 Interaction of Teacher and Parent Burnout on Spring of Pre-K Problem Behaviors



RESULTS

Q1: Is teacher burnout related to socialemotional competence (SEC) and self-regulation in the spring of preschool?

A1: Teacher burnout was not significantly related to social skills and self-regulation, but it was related to problem behaviors ($\beta = .28$, SE = .11. p = .01).

Q2: Does low parent burnout act as a protective factor in the relation of teacher burnout and SEC and self-regulation?

A2: We found significant interactions between teacher and parent burnout on social skills (ß=.58, SE=.18, p=.001; Figure 1) and on problem behaviors (β =-.72. SE =.18. p < .001: Figure 2). As teacher burnout decreased, child social skills increased and problem behaviors decreased, for children whose parents reported low burnout.

CONCLUSIONS

The findings of this study suggest that having a teacher as well as a parent with low burnout is important for children's social-emotional competence. This study elucidates the importance of considering burnout across children's caregivers in intervention work, caregiver trainings, and future studies.
